

Let's Talk About The Flu





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The flu is a sickness caused by a virus. It is also called "influenza." It can affect your nose, throat, head, and chest. You will feel very sick for 7 days. It can cause other problems. You may end up in the hospital. Some people die from the flu.

You may have:

Sore throat



Cough



Headache



Kids may also have:

Vomiting
Diarrhea
Stomach ache

Fever



Chills



Body aches





Sleepy



Runny nose



Sneezing



Staying Healthy

How can my family stay healthy?

Wash your hands with soap and warm water. Wash for 30 seconds.



Cough or sneeze into your elbow.
Do not cough or sneeze into your hand.



Get a flu vaccine. It is also called a flu shot. A flu vaccine helps protect you and your family from getting sick with the flu.



What should I do if I get sick?

Stay home until you have no fever for one day. Your temperature should be 98.6° F (37° C) or less. After you have no fever for one day, you can return to work or school.



Rest as much as you can.



Take acetaminophen for fever.
Acetaminophen is also called
Tylenol. Talk to your pharmacist first
before taking any medicine.



Drink lots of water.



Wash your hands with soap and warm water after you sneeze, cough, or blow your nose.



Flu Vaccines


Let's talk about flu vaccines.

- A flu vaccine will help protect you and your family from getting sick with the flu. Flu vaccines are very safe and they work well.
- Who should get a flu vaccine? The flu vaccine is for everyone older than six months of age.
- Who should not get a flu vaccine? You should not get a flu vaccine if you have a severe allergy to it.



- There are many different types of flu. Just as there are many different flowers. A flu vaccine teaches your body how to fight some types of flu. After your vaccine, your body will know how to fight those types of flu.
- Get a flu vaccine every year. Why? The flu changes every year. It is best to get the flu vaccine by the end of October to be ready in time for flu season.





Flu vaccines only prevent the flu!

- A flu vaccine only prevents some types of flu. The flu causes fever, chills, cough and body aches. It makes you very sick for 7 days.
- A flu vaccine will not protect you from other sickness. You can still get a cold, sore throat or vomiting.
