



Where to Get HPV Vaccination in Arkansas and How to Pay for It

HPV vaccination is routinely recommended for all persons (male and female), who are 11 to 12 years of age. HPV vaccine may be given to people as young as 9 years of age and also to people through 26 years of age, if they did not receive it earlier.

People, who receive their first dose of HPV vaccine before their 15th birthday, need only 2 doses of HPV vaccine. Everyone who receives their first dose on or after their 15th birthday will need 3 doses. All people with weakened immune systems will need 3 doses regardless of their age. For the 2-dose series, the second dose is given 6 to 12 months after the first dose. For the 3-dose series, the second dose is given 1 to 2 months after the first dose, and the third dose is given 6 to 12 months after the first dose. Each dose is given as a shot in the upper arm.

For persons aged 9 through 18 years, who are uninsured or on Medicaid, or who are American Indian or native Alaskan:

HPV vaccination is available at no cost to the patient from all Arkansas Department of Health local health units and any medical clinic that participates in the Vaccines for Children (VFC) program. Call ahead for an appointment and bring your Medicaid card, if you have one.

For persons aged 9 through 18 years with health insurance:

HPV vaccination is available at no cost to the patient through all of the Arkansas Department of Health local health units and usually at no cost through medical clinics that stock the HPV vaccine. Call ahead for an appointment and bring your insurance card.

For persons aged 9 through 26 years with insurance:

HPV vaccination is available at pharmacies that stock the HPV vaccine. It is usually at no cost to the patient, depending on their insurance.

- A doctor's prescription is required for a pharmacist to administer the HPV vaccine to any person aged 9 through 17 years.
- A doctor's prescription is sometimes required for a pharmacist to administer the HPV vaccine to persons aged 18 years and older. It depends on whether the pharmacy has an HPV vaccination protocol in place. In that case, a prescription will not be required.
- Call ahead to make sure the pharmacy has the HPV vaccine in stock and to check whether a doctor's prescription is needed, if the patient is 18 or older.

Persons aged 19 and older, who are uninsured or on Medicaid:

Persons without insurance or Medicaid will need to pay for HPV vaccination themselves at any pharmacy or medical clinic willing to administer the HPV vaccine to them. A doctor's prescription may be required at certain pharmacies.

- The total cost for Gardasil 9 is approximately \$540. This includes all three doses at about \$180 a dose. Gardasil 9 is the name of the only HPV vaccine currently available in the U.S.
- Persons who are unable to afford the cost of HPV vaccination may be eligible for Merck's Patient Assistance Program. Merck is the manufacturer of Gardasil 9. More information about the Merck Patient Assistance Program can be found at www.merckhelps.com.
